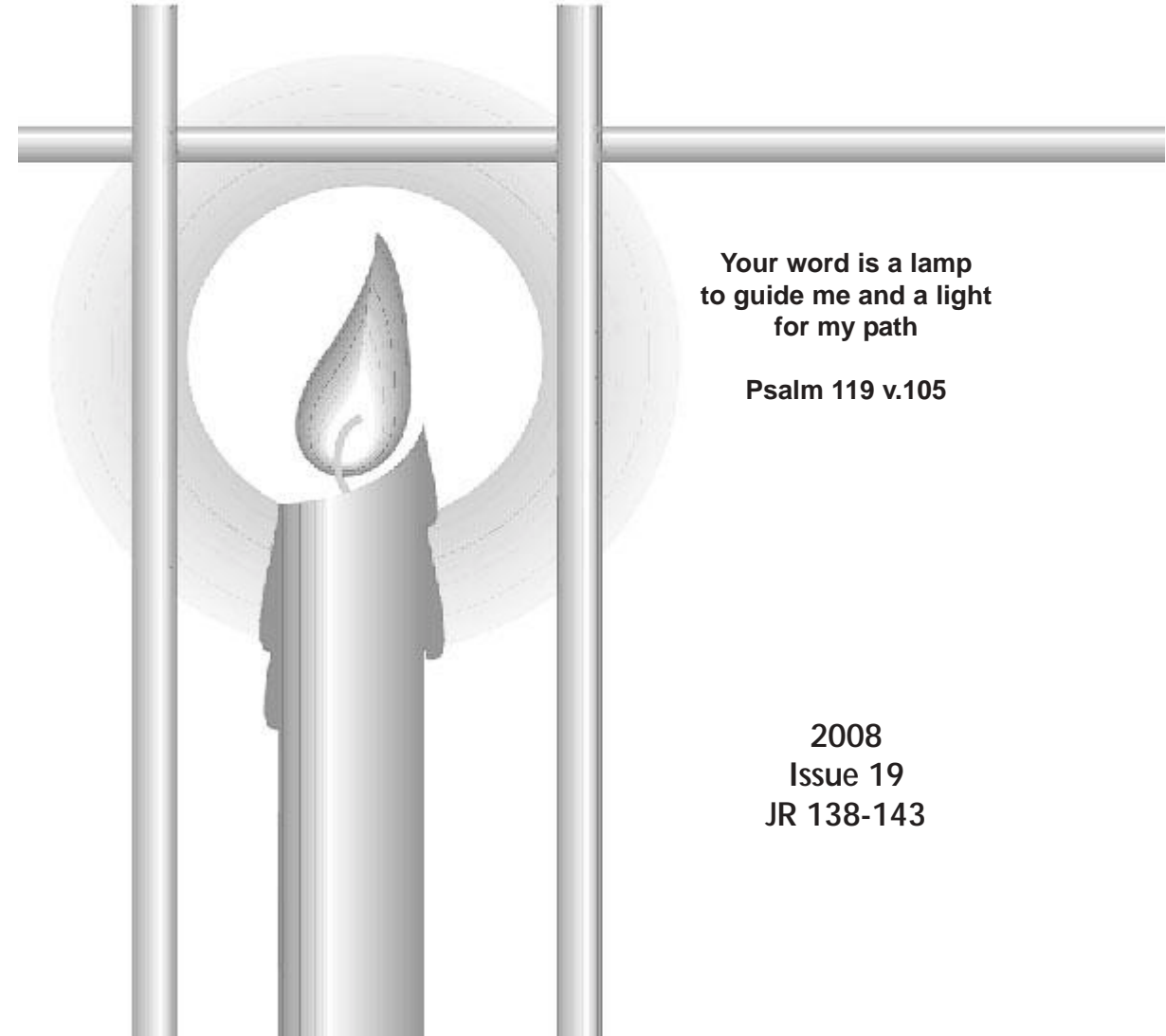

Its roots were established in 1950 at a congress in Rome convoked by the then Secretary of State at the Vatican, later Pope Paul VI. ICCPPC now has clerical and lay representatives in more than a hundred countries encouraging awareness of the importance of prison pastoral care. It is an NGO collaborating with international organisations with similar aims in defending human rights.

**Prison Fellowship International** is the global association of national Prison Fellowship organisations. These organisations are national Christian ministries responding to the needs of prisoners, ex-prisoners, victims and those affected by crime. All national PF organisations work through Christian communities mobilising ministry to prisoners, ex-prisoners, victims and their families as well as advancing the principles of restorative justice.

**The International Prison Chaplains' Association** is a network of prison chaplains committed to the spiritual and social care of people in conflict with the law. Founded in 1985 in Bossey, Switzerland, it seeks to encourage and equip chaplains around the world.
